

Jiby's journey with Kudumbashree began from its earliest days, and she embodies the remarkable impact the organization has had on women in Kerala. Jiby was the first chairperson of the Udayamperoor Community Development Society (CDS).

Later, she was also a member of a Kudumashree training group before being selected as a mentor resource person at Kudumbashree National Resource Organisation. Jiby's influence on the lives of countless women in Kerala and across the country cannot be overstated.

Funded mainly through her own income and awards, this institution today supports 60 students in their education and development.

Vandoor CDS, Malappuram

**62-year-old Nirmala made** and sold 10 bottles of pickles with mere 275 rupees that she borrowed from her neighbourhood group, in 2001. Since then, there has been no looking back for her. Today she runs a successful Cafe **Kudumbashree restaurant** that has a daily revenue of over Rs. 20,000 and has over 12 employees. She made it a point to employ widows, persons with disabilities, and members of families with other vulnerabilities. Her cafe also gives free meals to the needy. Nirmala's dedication to helping others extends beyond her business, as she has helped fund housing and medical equipment for those in need. She has received multiple awards for her contributions to the community.



I believe that everyone should have access to a helping hand when in need, and I strive to be that hand whenever possible. The Kudumbashree network has been a valuable support system for many of us, and I hope to pay it forward whenever I can.

### **JALAJA SHAJU**

Melukavu CDS, Kottayam

Jalaja Shaju became a food service entrepreneur through the training she received from Kudumbashree. A member of Kudumbashree since 2002, she has been successfully running her enterprise along with her partners for the past 8 years.





Initially, we were mocked for aspiring to be entrepreneurs. We endured all challenges and have been successfully running our enterprise for many years now. We have travelled across the country and Kudumbashree made it possible.



### **RADHA A**

Azhiyur CDS, Kozhikode

After losing her husband in 2000, Radha found a haven in Kudumbashree, which not only provided her with a means of income but also transformed her into a strong and courageous person. Radha served as the Chairperson of Azhiyur Community Development Society from 2005 to 2014, where she learned how to work with a community. In 2014, Kudumbashree National Resource Organisation posted her as a Mentor Resource Person in Assam, where she has become an inspiration to many women in India.





Every farmer in Muliyar had to rent tractors from nearby villages for ploughing. This caused a delay in our farming. Now that our group has its own tractor, we are able to do all of our activities on time. We also get a decent income from renting out the tractor on other days.



### **VALSALA**

Muliyar CDS, Wayanad

Valsala is a 45-year-old farmer from Muliyar Village. Along with two other Kudumbashree members, she formed a joint liability group (JLG) in 2012 and started collective farming of watermelons, wheat, and vegetables. With an annual revenue of 15 lakhs, the Pavizham JLG has been quite successful. They were also able to purchase their own tractor under the Sub-Mission on Agricultural Mechanisation (SMAM) scheme. Valsala's engagement highlights the importance of recognizing and supporting the contributions of women in agriculture, and the potential for equitable agricultural practices to improve the livelihoods of rural communities.



### RAJESWARI RAJAN

Kanjikkuzhy CDS, Idukki

A member of Kudumbashree for 20 years, Rajeswari has served as a Micro Enterprise Consultant as well as a Community Development Society vice chairperson. Further, she was elected to the Gram Panchayat committee twice and was president for a term.





Kudumbashree gave me the opportunity to work with people from all walks of life. Through the different roles I played in this organisation as well as an elected representative, I was able to understand the community's people's grievances, and needs and address them.



### PADMAVATHI K

Chemmanad CDS, Kasaragod

Padmavathi and her neighborhood group members, who primarily come from a farming background, established *Swathi Printing Press* in 2002 with the goal of providing a livelihood for all members of their group. Despite starting with a modest monthly revenue of Rs. 7,000, the press has since grown significantly, generating over Rs. 10 lakhs in monthly revenue and a monthly profit of Rs. 50,000.



# **DEVAKIKUTTY ANTHARJANAM**

Angadipuram CDS, Malappuram

Devakikutty Antharjanam, who used to make snacks called unniappams for her family in her free time, is now a successful entrepreneur catering to over 1000 people and has even started a YouTube channel named kidilammuthassy. Her active participation in the trade fairs and festivals organized by Kudumbashree has helped her grow her business.



Joining Kudumbashree made me start reading newspaper daily to learn about various programmmes, but it has also been critical in making me aware of myself and my surroundings.

For me, the satisfaction of being a part of the growth of numerous entrepreneurs, particularly women, has outweighed any monetary reward. It has given me a new sense of purpose, and the dignity and respect that I have earned among my family and friends are truly remarkable.

Aikkaranad CDS, Ernakulam



**Binimol joined Kudumbashree as** a Bima Mitra, enrolling women into insurance schemes. It was then that she was exposed to the vast opportunities within Kudumbashree. She went on to form an NHG, gathering nine other women from her neighbourhood. Joining as a volunteer responsible for income generation in the neighbourhood group, currently she serves as its secretary. Binimol along with her two friends started Hope and Safe - an agency for Geriatric Care Services.

### C.D. SARASWATHI

Thalir, Special Neighbourhood Group, Mananthawadi, Wayanad

Saraswathi was diagnosed with sickle-cell anaemia during her first pregnancy. She was among the founder leaders who established Sickle-Cell **Anaemia Patients' Association** in 1998, of which she is currently the State Secretary. She is a member of Thalir, Special **Neighbourhood Group, and** has been at the forefront of agitations demanding free treatment for sickle-cell anaemia. Their struggles turned fruitful with the government ensuring regular free supply of medicines to the patients. She won the Vanitharatnam award instituted by the Government of Kerala in 2019.



### **GEETHAS**

Panavoor S, Thiruvananthapuram

Geetha has been an active member of Kudumbashree since its early days. She has held several leadership positions, including Secretary and President of her Neighbourhood Group, and Chairperson of the Community Development Society. Since 2009, she has been working as a Micro Enterprise Consultant (MEC), helping Kudumbashree women to start their own businesses and earn their own income.





In many states, Gram Panchayats are exclusively men's spaces. As mentors, one of our roles was to make women realise that they too belonged there. I firmly believe that when women come together and voice their opinions in Gram Sabha, they cannot be ignored.

## **BINDU SANOJ**

Thidanadu CDS, Kottayam

The story of Bindu Sanoj offers life lessons for many aspiring young women who dream of a successful career. A member of Kudumbashree since 1998. she has been a Community **Development Society (CDS)** chairperson before becoming a mentor resource person for Kudumbashree National **Resource Organisation. She has** worked in states like Odisha, Tripura, Uttar Pradesh, and **Bihar under the Panchayati Raj Institution – Community Based Organisation (PRI-CBO) Convergence project of** Kudumbashree NRO.



For me, Kudumbashree is not just an organisation, but rather a university where I gained valuable life skills and essential values. It has helped me realise my rights and engage in planning processes at the panchayat level.



### **JUBILEE VINOD**

Alamcode CDS, Thiruvananthapuram

Jubilee is a member of one of the 19 training groups within **Kudumbashree, named Gender** and Livelihood Education Network. From an agricultural community, she went on to become a trainer and has since trained numerous women, within and outside the state.



### **MARY STANLY**

Member, KAASS, Wayanad

**Mary Stanly of Vellamunda Gram** Panchayat in Wayanad studied till masters in commerce. A **Kudumbashree member since** the early days, she got selected to Kudumbashree Accounts and **Audit Services Society (KAASS)** in 2008 and has worked since then auditing the accounts of the Kudumbashree community network. Presently she earns Rs 20,000 to 25,000 per month. She has been able to share the cost of building a house with her husband and educate her children the way she wanted.

Despite being educated, I was unemployed. For me, the auditor's role in Kudumbashree was a dream come true. I enjoy the work so much, after all these years despite my health issues. And I am not the only one; there are several women in the village who have found a means of income through Kudumbashree.

# I wanted to be self-sufficient and not rely on my family for a living. Despite taking up various jobs, I was dissatisfied as they did not provide a steady income. When the company I was working for shut down due to the Covid pandemic, I was left without a job. That's when I discovered Yuvashree and received training in housekeeping. I am currently earning 25,000 a month and I am

pleased that I can contribute to my family's finances.

### PRITI NIVEDHAN

Puthenvelikkara CDS, Ernakulam

Born and brought up in Maharashtra, Priti came to Kerala after her marriage. Priti joined Kudumbashree in 2010, while she was a housewife. Because of financial constraints, she took up a job in a construction company and thereafter in a showroom but lost her job during Covid Lockdown. The *Yuvashree* project under Kudumbashree trained her in housekeeping operations and she is currently employed as a housekeeping supervisor.





Women in our tribal settlement used to stay within their households. Today, they earn a livelihood, access banks and have achieved financial literacy. Kudumbashree made this possible, through its ground level interventions.



### RADHA BAIJU

Mankulam CDS, Idukki

Radha is one among the first women from her settlement to be part of the Kudumbashree network. A Mahatma Gandhi National Rural Employment Guarantee Act worker herself, she has also served as the Community Development Society chairperson of Mankulam for a term.





Kolayad CDS, Kannur

Riji had tried out may jobs to support her family before marriage. It was on failure of the marriage that she had to return to her village in Kannur. Hailing from Kurichya, a tribal community, Riji got the opportunity to contest from a ward reserved for scheduled tribes in Kolayad Gram Panchayat. She further became the president of the Gram Panchayat. Riji has worked as a **Promoter under the Scheduled Tribes Development Department** too. She considers building her own house with Kudumbashree support as her biggest personal achievement in life.

### RAMANI CHAKRAPANI

Ramani is a resident of Pinavurkudi, a tribal area in Ernakulam District. With support from Kudumbashree, she learned to drive and purchased an auto rickshaw. She also started a coffee powder unit, Roopashree Coffee Unit, with four other members, which now stores up to 300 kg of coffee beans and sells across the Ernakulam district. Ramani's entrepreneurship journey is a testament to her determination and the power of community support.

From an introverted person, to the leader I am today, Kudumbashree has enabled me to face challenges and overcome them. Through Kudumbashree I was able to intervene in people's issues and support them in their needs.

### **RANJINI PRADEEP**

Meenachil CDS, Kottayam

Ranjini joined Kudumbashree at a very young age. After serving as the Community Development Society chairperson of Meenachil, she went on to become an elected representative of the Meenachil municipal council. An artist herself, she has performed on many platforms within and outside Kudumbashree.

Niramaruthur CDS, Malappuram

Safna has been a member of **Kudumbashree since 2006 and** has obtained certifications in various courses such as food safety, legal metrology, and pollution control. In 2019, she founded We Help, based in Niramaruthur Gram Panchayat, Malappuram. Through her enterprise, Safna provides women with the skills and resources needed to succeed in entrepreneurship and leadership and supports them in formalization. Her consultancy has serviced over 1000 enterprises through her consultancy work.

Panavally CDS, Alappuzha

A Kudumbashree member since 2012, Sabeena is a dynamic and accomplished entrepreneur. With a background in leadership roles as Neighbourhood Group **Secretary and Area Development Society and Microenterprise** subcommittee convener, she is an experienced community leader. Sabeena's entrepreneurial spirit is showcased in her successful enterprise, Ajwa Foods, which specializes in masala powders and homemade pickles. Her experience as a Micro **Enterprise Consultant adds to** her wealth of knowledge in both community development and business management.



As a B. Com graduate struggling to find a job after marriage, Kudumbashree gave me the inspiration to become an entrepreneur. Seema emphasizes that her Kudumbashree membership was not by accident; instead, she took initiative and formed her neighborhood group. While she tried to utilise all the platforms that Kudumbashree provided her, she was elected to the Gram Panchayat once. Seema's focus has always been on farming from which she makes Rs 10,000 per month on an average. She has been able to avail support from Kudumbashree for her farming projects.

Kudumbashree helped me not only in speaking on public platforms, but it also enhanced my status within my family. Kudumbashree has been a support and guide in all my endeavours.

## One incident from my Kudumbashree activities that will always stay with me is the rehabilitation of a destitute family through Asraya. When we first visited their house, the sight was shocking: two mentally challenged individuals lived in a dilapidated house with no support. We took the initiative to bathe them, clean their house, and provide them with food. The expression on their faces during this process is

When Santhwanam, an enterprisebased model for door-to-door health check up was formulated, Kudumbashree made it open to the family members of **Kudumbashree network. Sunitha** used that opportunity to set up a health check-up unit. She got training from Health Action for People, a Non-Government Organisation that partnered with **Kudumbashree for the project.** Sunitha now earns around Rs 8000 per month through her enterprise.

**Currently a mentor core group** member of Kudumbashree **National Resource Organisation,** Beena is one among the first **Community Development Society** chairpersons of Kudumbashree. Widowed at a young age, she found respite in the activities of **Kudumbashree and went on to** become a founding member of EKSAT, a training group within **Kudumbashree. Starting her** career at a mere Rs.50 per day, Beena today earns up to Rs. 10,000 a day as a resource person for other agencies.



I used to tell any visitor no one was at home if my husband was away. But not anymore. Now I would respond just as my husband would. To me, it was a transformation to feel that ownership. Contrary to my notion, what I earned from Kudumbashree is beyond financial stability.

## MANJU MATHEW

Pampadumpara CDS, Idukki

Manju's family had migrated from Bhimanadi in Kasaragod to Idukki, where they lost their farmland to the Mathikettan Shola National Park in 2003. When Manju got married at 19, her family was in dire straits. She joined Kudumbashree and later became part of a joint liability group (JLG) engaged in leased land farming. After meeting with a total loss on their first attempt, they took a Kudumbashree loan and invested in land development, and cultivated vegetables and tuber crops. Subsequently, the JLG started a plant nursery, changing the group's fortunes. The group was the first to try technologies such as poly house and greenhouses in Nedumkandam Block.

She** relinquished her position in the organisation once she started working with Kudumbshree **Accounts and Auditing Services** Society (KAASS). Presently the president of her KAASS group, she has aspirations of a political career too.

Joining Kudumbashree has been a turning point in my life. Coming from a family with low income, my mother struggled to raise my siblings and me. When I joined my NHG in 1998, I didn't know much about Kudumbashree. Initially, I set aside money from the tuition I was giving to pay my thrift. However, after becoming a KAASS member, I started earning a steady income. Currently, I earn around Rs. 26,000 from the activities of KAASS alone. More than the income, being involved with Kudumbashree has given me the confidence to be independent. I have taken up independent audits, including that of a school.

## **SAJITHA P T**

Nilambur Municipality CDS, Malappuram

Sajitha has been a member of Kudumbashree since 1998. Despite having to shift to Nilambur after her marriage, she remained connected to Kudumbashree, forming a new neighbourhood group (NHG). She enrolled as a member of Kudumbashree Accounts and Audit Services Society (KAAS) in 2008. She has been able to provide for her family, through the regular income she earns through auditing and other functions of Kudumbashree.

## Glossary

## **Kudumbashree Structure**

The community structure of Kudumbashree federation comprises three tiers: **Neighbourhood Groups (NHG)** at the household level, **Area Development Societies (ADS)** at the ward level, and **Community Development Societies (CDS)** at the Gram Panchayat level.

The Kudumbashree State mission facilitates different programmes and the operations are delegated to the district mission offices.

Amritham Nutrimix - Amritham Nutrimix is a nutritious food product that has been developed by Kudumbahsree to address malnutrition among children and pregnant women in rural areas. The product is fortified with essential vitamins and minerals and is a cost-effective solution to the problem of malnutrition. It has been recognized by the government and is being promoted by the Integrated Child Development Services (ICDS) program as Take Home Ration since 2006. Additionally, the involvement of Kudumbashree women in the production and distribution of Amritham Nutrimix has provided them with incomegenerating opportunities and helped in their economic empowerment.

**Asraya** - Asraya is an integrated project aimed at identification and rehabilitation of destitute families. It was started in 2002 as a follow up of the Kudumbashree initiative to identify the poorest of the poor families that had been left out from the outreach of decentralised planning and poverty alleviation programmes. In 2017, the Asraya project was restructured into a more comprehensive program called Destitute Free Kerala (Agathirahitha Keralam).

**Buds School** - Kudumbashree initiated a program called Buds to provide education and care for mentally challenged children and adults in rural areas of Kerala. The program started with the first institution in 2004

and expanded to the Buds Rehabilitation Center in 2015, which focuses on rehabilitation, training and day care for mentally challenged adults. Buds aims to provide an inclusive atmosphere for mentally challenged individuals without stigmatizing or labeling them.

**Gender Programmes** - Gender Programmes of Kudumbashree aims to create awareness about the rights, status and justice of women by themselves through the discussions of their experiences, identify their role in the local development process, and equip women to recognize about their rights, inequalities and violence against them. Through Gender Self Learning Programme (GSLP), Kudumbashree seeks to generate public discourse and political debate regarding the important relationship between sexuality, gender, and human rights.

**Joint Liability Group (JLG)** - JLG refers to a collective farming approach where groups of women farmers under Kudumbahsree come together to undertake agricultural activities. Members of the group share resources, risks and benefits.

**Kudumbashree Accounts and Auditing Service Society (KAASS)** - KAASS is an enterprise group affiliated with Kudumbashree who are authorized to conduct periodic audits of NHG, ADS and CDS as well as other enterprises established within the programmes of Kudumbashree.

Kudumbashree National Resource Organisation (NRO) - Ministry of Rural Development recognised Kudumbashree as an NRO under the National Rural Livelihoods Mission (NRLM) in 2013. Kudumbashree NRO provides technical and implementation assistance to the State Rural Livelihood Missions (SRLMs) in two domains - making Panchayati Raj Institutions (PRIs) and Community Based Organisations (CBOs) work together (PRI-CBO Convergence) and enterprise development.

## Micro Enterprise Consultant (MEC) Project

- MEC Project is a Kudumbashree programme to promote micro-enterprise development through trained community resource persons for enterprise promotion known as Micro Enterprise Consultants.

## MGNREGA (Mahatma Gandhi National Rural Employment Guarantee Act)-

MGNREGA is a government scheme that guarantees 100 days of employment to rural households. In Kerala, Kudumbashree, plays an important role in implementing MGNREGA by ensuring active participation of its members in the program. Kudumbashree women are involved in various stages of the process, from identifying potential job sites to monitoring the progress of the work. They also help in organizing work camps, preparing muster rolls, and ensuring timely payment of wages to the workers. This has not only improved the effectiveness of the program but has also empowered women by providing them with opportunities.

**Start-up Village Entrepreneurship Programme (SVEP)** - SVEP is a national programme developed

based on the Micro Enterprise Consultant (MEC) project and aims to provide financial assistance, business management and soft skills training, and critical services to early-stage rural enterprises. SVEP focuses on creating sustainable livelihoods and self-employment opportunities for the rural poor through a trained local cadre of business consultants.

**Santhwanam** - Santhwanam is a health intervention project by Kudumbashree, in collaboration with Health Action by People (HAP) and State Bank of India (SBI), providing periodic check-ups at home by trained entrepreneurs to detect diseases early.

**Training Groups** within Kudumbashree were established to train Kudumbashree members on the operations and different programmes of Kudumbashree.

**Tribal Special Project (TSP)** - The Tribal Special Project is an initiative of Kudumbashree in collaboration with the Tribal department to address the special issue of the tribal population of the state, in a systematic manner. The project primarily targets at bringing the marginalized tribals under the aegis of the Kudumbashree network and provide them with facilities which were otherwise less accessible or denied.

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## **Kudumbashree State Poverty Eradication Mission**

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
